Who we are...

The 'Northwestern Ontario Integrated Care Working Group' – consisting of approximately 30 cross-sectoral and cross-geography system partners – has been working together to develop recommendations on:

- A local Ontario Health Team (or other more culturally appropriate model of care) coverage model for the North West;
- A coordinated approach to planning for regional specialized services; and,
- What regional-level resources/supports may be required going forward.

Evolved from the Working Group that developed a regional proposal for Ontario Health Teams in 2019.




Our work and what it means...

Integrated Care...what does it mean for patients/clients?


Moving from...

A system where patients/clients experience care in <u>silos</u> – where people have to share their information multiple times or have trouble navigating their care as they transition through their journey and access various services by various different teams....

To...

A system where patients/clients receive their care from one team – where people's information is shared seamlessly through their journey and all of their care providers work collaboratively to ensure they receive the care they need, when and where they need it

How will we improve patient care through integration? We will continue to work together regionally...

Regional Specialized Services

- Services that require specific expertise and resources
- Meet the needs and ensure access to care for a defined geographical population
- Require broader planning at the district, regional or provincial level

Regional enablers:

- Health Information System and digital technologies
- Health Human Resources
- System level planning



How we will continue to work together regionally...

To facilitate a **coordinated approach to specialized services the following is recommended**:

- 1. <u>Leverage existing networks</u> to advance the goals of local integrated care systems (i.e. OHTs)
- 2. Continue to <u>utilize the Northwestern Ontario Integrated Care Working Group</u> to advance discussions that require regional coordination



How will we improve patient care through integration?

We will support seamless and integrated care at the community level...


In formulating recommendations, the following principles for organizing OHTs/Models of Integrated Care, were considered:

- 1. Status quo is not an option
- Any models we pursue must support: integrated delivery of care at the local community level; what is already working well locally; and, improved connection to the broader regional system
- 3. Our models need to be supported by a reasonable level of data however, it's not only about existing referral or utilization patterns it's also about:
 - Safe, timely, effective, efficient, equitable and patient-centred care
 - Economies of scale
 - Readiness and willingness of partners
- 4. We need to start somewhere we won't get it perfect, and we may not even get it right at the start



How we can support locally integrated care...

Proposed Model for working together locally



- Kenora (All Nations Health Partners) approved OHT
- Atikokan/Rainy River/Emo/Fort Frances (Rainy River District) – approved OHT
- 3. Dryden/Red Lake
- 4. Thunder Bay/Nipigon
- 5. Marathon/Terrace Bay/Manitouwadge

- Geraldton




How it all fits together...
